B. The College

Florida State University (FSU) is an internationally recognized teaching and research institution located in Tallahassee, FL. FSU offers degree programs in Panama City; the Republic of Panama; London, England; Florence, Italy; and online. The University offers 94 Bachelors' degree programs; 114 Master's degrees; 27 Specialist and Advanced Master's degrees; and 73 doctoral degrees.

C. Background

The U.S. Department of Education (the Department) scheduled a program review to coincide with the Quality Assurance Review (QAR) that the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Criminal Justice Information Service (CJIS) Audit Unit conducted at FSU. The Department partnered with the CJIS Audit Unit to ensure accurate crime reporting on America's college campuses.

D. Scope of Review

The Department conducted a Clery Act review at FSU from February 10, 2009 to February 13, 2009. The review was conducted by Sherry Blackman, Cliff Knight, Geneva Leon and James Moore. The initial focus of the Federal Student Aid review was to examine the College's compliance with The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act). Our review included determining the accuracy and completeness of all campus crime statistics reported for selected incident categories and compliance with all policy disclosure requirements.

The FSA review team examined the College's records related to campus safety including all incident reports that were maintained by the Campus Security Department for the calendar year 2007. The FSA review team also obtained and reviewed the student disciplinary files for students who were adjudicated under the College's disciplinary process during the same year.

Disclaimer:

Although the review was thorough, it cannot be assumed to be all-inclusive. The absence of statements in the report concerning the institution's specific practices and procedures must not be construed as acceptance, approval, or endorsement of those specific practices and procedures. Furthermore, it does not relieve FSU of its obligation to comply with all of the statutory or regulatory provisions governing the Title IV, HEA programs.

This report reflects initial findings. These findings are not final. The Department will issue its final findings in a subsequent Final Program Review Determination letter.

E. Findings

During the review, several areas of noncompliance were noted. Findings of noncompliance are referenced to the applicable statutes and regulations, and specify the actions to be taken by FSU to bring operations of the Clery Act into compliance with the statutes and regulations.

Finding #1: Policy for Preparing the Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics Not Developed/Implemented:

Citation: 34 C.F.R. § 668.46(c) (1)

Federal regulations require institutions participating in Title IV to develop a policy for preparing an Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics. The policy must include the following elements:

- a brief description explaining who prepares the report;
- how the statistics were collected;
- and from what sources the crime statistics are collected

Noncompliance:

FSU did not develop a policy for preparing an Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics.

Required Action:

The College failed to develop this policy for calendar year 2007. FSU must write their Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics policy and incorporate the above elements, which are required by the Department, and provide a copy of the policy in its response to this report.

Finding #2: - Failure to Properly Code Crime Statistics

Citation: 34 C.F.R. § 668.46(c) (1) and (7)

Federal regulations require that participating institutions properly code crime statistics concerning the occurrence on campus of the following offenses: homicide, manslaughter, forcible and non-forcible sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and arson. In addition, the institution is required to disclose disciplinary actions related to violations of Federal or State drug, liquor and weapons laws.

Noncompliance:

FSU failed to properly code the following offenses:

- 5 aggravated assaults
- 3 burglaries
- 1 forcible sex offense

Case # 07-0834 - This FSU student was struck in the head with a bottle in the parking lot west of the Sandels Building. The suspect fled the scene. EMS arrived and evaluated the student who refused to be transported to the hospital for the cut on his head. This case was coded as Aggravated Battery; however, the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program defines this crime as Aggravated Assault and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-1918 – On 07/14/2007, a FSU police officer responded to the Kappa Alpha Fraternity in reference to an injured person. An investigation revealed that a battery to an individual who was lying on his bed with blood on his face, arms and chest and complaining about pain in his ribs. There were no known suspects at the time. This case was coded as Aggravated Battery; however, the UCR defines this crime as Aggravated Assault and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-2104 – Tallahassee Memorial Hospital contacted the FSU police department. The student advised he was involved in a fight at Dogwood/Call street area with three unknown white males. The victim suffered lacerations over eyes and hands, swollen knuckles, nose and forehead and left nostril was split open. The victim was knocked unconscious. This case was coded as Aggravated Battery; however, the UCR defines this crime as Aggravated Assault and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-2363 – Officers responded to the Westcott Fountain regarding a physical altercation. The suspects were located on Call St. and were identified as the persons involved in the altercation, which included the victim who was struck across the face with a tire iron. The victim refused to be transported to the hospital and had friends take him. The suspects were charged with aggravated battery, simple battery and other miscellaneous criminal charges. The suspects and the victim had no FSU affiliation. This case was coded as Aggravated Battery; however, the UCR defines this crime as Aggravated Assault and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-2466 – An FSU Police Officer was dispatched to the area of University D for a fight in progress. Upon arrival, one witness advised the officer that one of the white males struck the other in the face and knocked him unconscious. The victim also suffered a bloody nose, bloody mouth and swollen right eye and skinned right knee. Suspects were unable to be located. This case was coded as Battery; however, the UCR defines this crime as Aggravated Assault and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-1739 – On 06/02/2007 an unknown individual was seen burglarizing and office inside the Westcott Building by a FSU employee. The individual ran from the office with two stolen items. This case was coded as Theft; however, the UCR defines this crime as Burglary and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-1512 - The school of Theatre reported that a Sony digital camera was stolen from an office between 5/16/2007 and 5/18/2007. A suspect was identified. This case was coded as Buying, Receiving, Possessing Stolen Property, and False Pretenses/Swindle; however, the UCR defines this crime as Burglary and should be coded as such.

Case # 0711-3243 – An FSU employee left his wallet in his desk while at a meeting. Some unknown person(s) entered the office and removed the wallet. A Visa card was used at various locations. This case was coded as Theft; however, the UCR defines this crime as Burglary and should be coded as such.

Case # 07-3014 – On October 20, 2007 a complaint was received from a female in reference to a male who grabbed her groin area and pulled her towards him. The incident occurred inside of the University Center Ballroom during the football game. This case was coded as Battery; however, the UCR defines this crime as Forcible Fondling and should be coded as such.

Required Action:

As a result of this finding, FSU is required to take all necessary corrective actions to cure the exceptions identified in this program review report. In addition, FSU must develop and implement a comprehensive system of policies and procedures to ensure that these findings do not recur and submit a copy of those procedures in its response.

Based on an evaluation of all available information including the institution's response, the team will determine appropriate additional actions and advise FSU of these in our Final Program Review Determination letter.

#3 - Failure to Properly Define the Campus within the Four Components Of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program

Citation: 34 C.F.R. § 668.46 (a) (1) and (2)

Federal regulations require institutions to compile and publish separate crime statistics for each location or facility. The citation above defines a campus that includes:

- 1) On Campus I: any building or property owned or controlled by the institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographical area and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls;
- 2) On Campus II: any building or property owned by the institution that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified above, but is controlled by another person or entity;
- 3) Non-Campus Property: any building or property owned or controlled by a recognized student organization; or any building or property owned and controlled by the institution as described in 1. above but is not in the same reasonably contiguous area; and,
- 4) Public Property: all public property that is within the boundaries of the campus or that is immediately adjacent to or accessible from the campus.

Generally, an institution must comply with the statistical reporting requirements for each administrative division, location, or property that is not in the same reasonably contiguous geographical area as the main location.

Noncompliance:

The College has several properties, including the Mag Center, near the golf course, that was designated as non-campus property. These properties should have been designated as on-campus due to the fact that it is campus property within contiguous geographical area used by the institution in direct support of the institution.

Required Action:

The College must review all property that it owns and/or controls, and re-define its campus to meet the criteria of the four-part definition of campus under the UCR. With its response, FSU must provide a copy of the revised policy that includes this definition and an accurate list of all properties that it currently owns and/or controls. This analysis must be completed in advance of the preparation of the next annual campus security report.

Once the campus is properly defined the College must then take all necessary steps to ensure that all incidents of crime reported are included in the statistical disclosure section of all campus security reports. As part of this review, FSU must also develop and implement a program of internal controls that will ensure that crime statistics are reported separately for all non-contiguous locations.

Based on an evaluation of all available information including the institution's response, the team will determine appropriate additional actions and advise the College of these in our Final Program Review Determination letter.

#4 - Failure to Include the Disposition Field on the Crime Log

Citation: 34 C.F.R. § 668.46 (f)

The UCR requires institutions with a police or campus security department to maintain a written, easily understood daily crime log listing all crimes that occurred. The log must include the nature, date, time, general location and disposition of each offense. The crime log must be kept up to date and be freely accessible to any requestor.

Noncompliance:

FSU Police Department failed to include the disposition field on the Crime Log.

Required Action:

The Clery Act is a consumer information requirement intended to provide students, employees, and other stakeholders with vital information that they can use to make good safety decisions and effectively assist in providing for their own security. The crime log is especially important because it provides a timely information source, and supplements the long-view trend data in the campus security report's statistical disclosures. Failure to comply with the daily crime log requirement deprives the campus community of this vital security information.

FSU must review and revise its policies and procedures to ensure compliance with this requirement going forward. These revisions must provide for the designation of a capable official to ensure that the crime log is updated in an accurate and complete manner and that it is readily available to the campus community and general public for review upon request.

#5 – Weaknesses in School's Internal Control Policy/Procedures

Citation: 34 C.F.R. § 668.46

The Federal regulations require institutions to compile and publish statistics of arrests and disciplinary referrals for certain Part II violations of liquor, drug, and weapons laws.

Noncompliance:

A sample of 25 Part II incident, arrest, and disciplinary reports was requested and reviewed. While no specific coding or reporting violations were identified in the sample, the review team determined that FSU's policies and procedures for documenting offenses in a student's disciplinary file and in the Housing Office's database were not always followed. Specifically, four of the 23 files received were incomplete and two files could not be located at all. Additionally, it was determined that statistics for FSU Student Conduct Code (5)(g)(5), Providing Alcoholic Beverages to an individual Under the Age

of 21, were not provided to the Florida State University Police Department (FSUPD) for inclusion in the Crime Statistics Report. As a result of these internal control weaknesses, the sample was expanded to include all six offenses that were classified as (5) (g) (5) violations. These records were provided by the Housing Office on April 10, 2009.

Required Action:

FSU must follow its policy and procedures for documenting each offense in a student's disciplinary file and also in the Housing Office's database for Part II violations. The Department has gained reasonable assurances that liquor law disciplinary referrals were not underreported, although there were administrative weaknesses identified during the review. During follow-up interviews, the Director of Housing and the former Assistant Director explained corrective measures that were already underway at the time of the site visit and assured the Department that additional improvements will be made as a result of the program review. Improvements include: 1) full operability and utilization of the Adirondack Solutions system; 2) improved controls over hardcopy documents; 3) improved staff training; 4) periodic auditing of disciplinary files for accuracy and completeness (began Fall 2007 and expanded in 2008); and 5) improved coordination with the Office of the Dean of Students and the FSUPD. FSU must submit a copy of the new procedures that include the corrective measures above and submit it as part of its response.

One primary purpose of these requirements is to ensure that the campus security report due by October 1, 2009 is prepared and distributed in accordance with all Clery Act requirements.
